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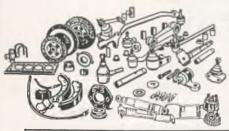

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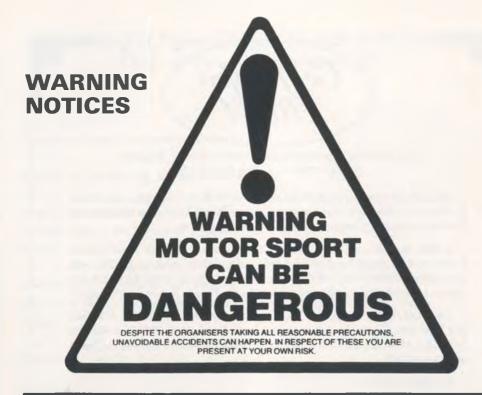

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The Bishop's Appeal aims to raise £1.2 million for four purposes, which all have the common theme of Renewal. They are the renewal of human lives in depressed inner city areas, the renewal of buildings and equipment for Church Schools, the renewal of the West Front of the Cathedral and the renewal of many Parish Churches in the diocese that need urgent repairs.

What's it all about?

Fund raiser David Stoneham explains the aims and objectives of the Bishop's Appeal

Church Urban Fund

This Fund has been set up to help to do something about the problems of the most deprived areas of our inner cities and estates. Homelessness among young people is a growing problem, and girls in this situation are particularly vulnerable. In Middleton in Leeds, for example, the Church is working with the City Council and YWCA to set up a hostel where homeless girls can find refuge, while they look for longer term accommodation. The Church Urban Fund has provided money to pay for some-one to train the girls in domestic and housekeeping skills so that they will be better equipped to face the future. In the case of Leeds grants have been made for 11 community projects carefully designed to help those most disadvantaged by poverty. One project is providing a mediation service to help resolve disputes that arise among neighbours in densely populated and poverty stricken areas. Another project has provided a Community Centre where counselling is available. In similar ways the fund is helping those living in depressed urban areas in Tyneside, Barnsley, Birmingham, London and throughout the country. It is seeking to bring renewal to the unemployed, to children and young people, to single parents and to the elderly living on their own. The Patron of the Fund is Her Majesty the Oucen.

Church Schools

Church Schools have to find a proportion of the cost of rebuilding and of new equipment to complement what is financed by the State. A major building and equipment programme is under way to meet the requirements of the new National Curriculum and the increasing numbers of pupils.

The Church needs to raise the money to invest in the education of these young people.

Ripon Cathedral

The magnificent Early English 13th century West front of the Cathedral had deteriorated badly with the passage of time and the effect of the weather, including a bad storm two years ago. The work of renewal has now been completed, and the appeal is finding money to pay for it.

Parish Churches

Many Parishes are struggling to pay for essential repairs to beautiful and historic Churches. The cost of a new roof can represent over £1,000. per church member. Congregations generously supported by their local communities are making huge efforts to raise the money needed for repairs, but there is often a gap between what has been raised and what is needed to put work in hand. The Bishop is appealing for a fund to supplement what has been raised locally with either a grant or a loan. There is an urgent need for help with the renewal of our heritage of historic Church buildings.

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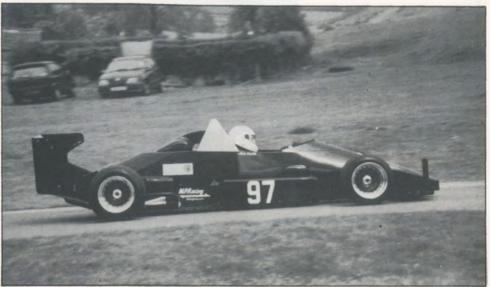

It also has a great variety of cars. Standard road cars, with limited modification, make up an important part of the entry. CCC magazine has been for many years the champion of the 'Racing Your Road Car' concept. This has been underlined this year by the performance of Championship leading driver Peter Sacree in his rapid Honda Civic Vtec. Peter's weekend competition machine also doubling up as his company car!

Moving to the rather less practical, the kit car class has been without doubt one of the closest fought. This class includes Caterhams, Westfields and even the odd Dutton and the difference between winning or not is regularly measured in mere tenths of a second. Ashley Buchanan-Morris, Neil Davison and CCC's Editor Nigel Fryatt have had a very close battle all season.

If the kit cars look close, there have been times

when some of the Modified cars appear joined at hip. Chris Judge, Neville Moon in their marvellous Minis and Peter Millington in the much lighter Clan Crusader have all enjoyed a super season. Paul Reynolds in his Modified Westfield has been quietly producing the goods, even taking Fastest Time of the Day at Valence hillstimb.

The marvellous mixture of clubmans machines have seen Chris Rivett, Chris Farr and Ross McCartney regularly battling it out throughout the season. In the Formula Fords. Mark Harman has been taking on various members of the Macklin clan - who seem to be able to get more people in a Formula Ford than you would ever think possible.

The Fastest runner in any CCC/BARC Speed Championship round is usually a battle between Melvyn Coon and Roy Millbank, although we have certainly enjoyed the all-too-rare appearances of Clive Harris and Clive Wooster. As for this round at Croft, I am certainly looking forward to tackling a new venue in my Caterham. Anyone wishing to know more about the Championship is very welcome to come over and have a chat. 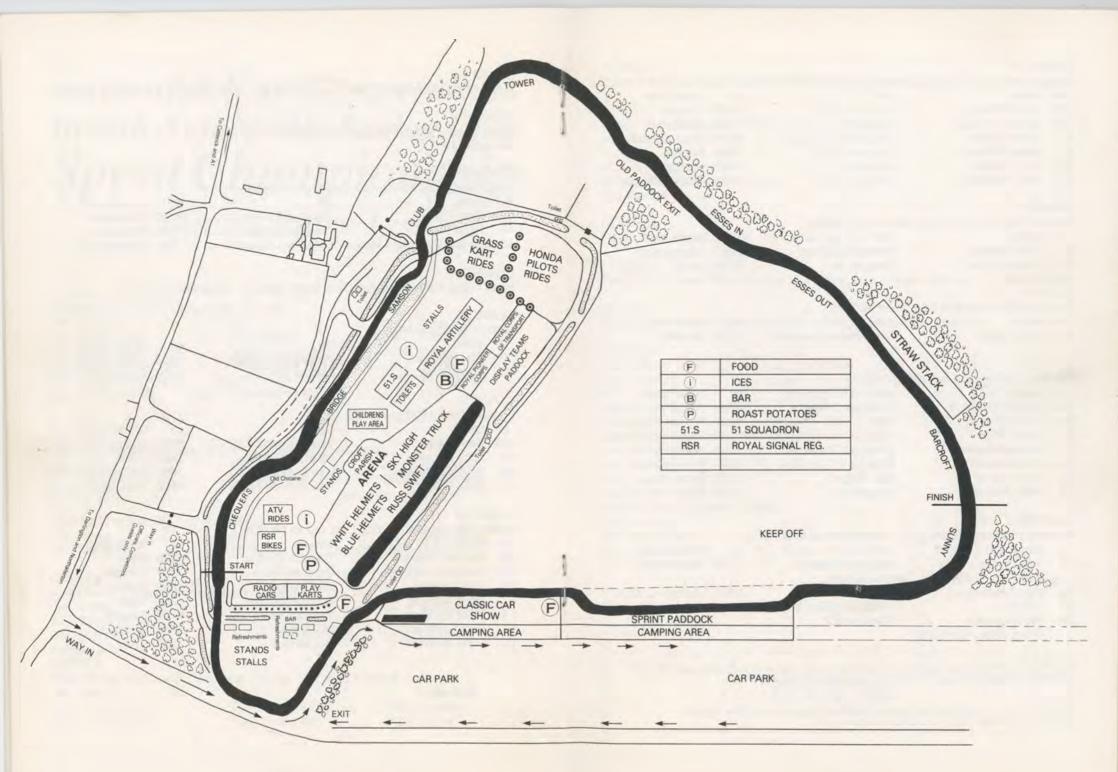

Royal Signals - a panoply of displays









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Since being moved to Catterick in 1987 the Royal Signals Freefall Parachute Display Team has become progressively busier, increasing its participation in shows from just seven in that first year to 48 in 1991. This year the 'Blue Helmets' as they are more widely known will take part in over 40 shows, mostly in England but including the Rhine Army Summer Show in Germany. Prior to their move to North Yorkshire, a spiritual home as they were originally formed at Army Apprentices College Harrogate, the Blue Helmets had been based in the South of England along with a number of other military parachute display teams. In the early years the main function of the team was to provide a forum for parachuting within the Royal Signals, particularly for young Signallers. Training students and taking part in competitions, it was not long before the team was representing the Army and Great Britain in World Class parachuting events. In 1992 the Blue Helmet display team is restricted to a five man operation due to the number of experienced parachutists available. A month long training camp in Cyprus was undertaken earlier this year during which time a number of inexperienced Royal Signals parachutists were progressively trained by the team. In November the team will return to Cyprus but this time

Local heroes



The Royal Signals White Helmet Motorcycle Display Team will bend over backwards to please their public but this is no soft option. There is an element of danger in their show which is derived from skills used by motorcycle dispatch riders. In great International demand today's show is on 'home' territory for this financially self sufficient team.

Initially formed in 1927 as a team to display the combined skills of motorcycle and horse riding this World renowned team officially became the Royal Signals White Helmets in 1963, by which time the internal combustion engine had usurped the horse. Being a White Helmet team member is no joy ride and those performing for you today have come successfully through a two week selection course which is held on the Yorkshire moors - in winter! Once through that selection process there is a five month training period before donning the coveted White Helmet. There is a minimum three year service period with the Catterick based team before returning to normal military service but to be a motorcycle rider is not a pre-requisite for entry, fewer than eight of the 36 team members hold full motorcycle licences. The Royal Signals White Helmets enjoy a high profile with regular TV appearances and tours throughout the UK and Western Europe between May and October every year. Their display is exciting but carries with it the inherent risk of riding at close proximity to other motorcycles, often with closing speeds of 60mph. Demanding a high degree of concentration and expertise the demonstrations reflect the skill and courage of the Royal Signals Dispatch Rider from two World Wars as well as the versatility of the modern Royal Signals soldier.

A milk float is just about the only type of vehicle that Russ Swift has *not* driven on two wheels. For this local man driving on two wheels has become second nature in recent years and it is a skill which has taken him around the World. And the relevance of the milk float?. Not so many years ago you may well have found Russ Swift delivering your daily pinta!.



Swift by name.....

Autotests were the arena in which Swift honed to perfection the skills that have taken him from milky to international superstar. It was a discipline in which he won every major championship in both 1982 and '83, that National success coming on the back of a reputation of near legendary proportions established in the North East where, between 1972 and '77. Swift was almost unbeaten. In 1986 Swift made the break and went full time with his display work, Vauxhall being among his earliest employers and one which he retains to this day - early in 1993 Russ is to spend 10 days in Barcelona on the launch of a new Vauxhall and will be driving inside the building where some of the Olympic events recently took place. Perhaps his most widely remembered work though is the Montego television advert. You know, the one where the car performs all manner of tricks before being flung - almost literally into an improbably small parking space. On the back of that success Swift has toured as the 'Montego Display Team' for the last few years and that is the team that should have appeared here today. However, the Montego has been pensioned off and Russell's crack squad will be using their new Rovers for today's display. Competition has not played a great part in Swift's life in recent years, following his autotest success Russ proved himself to be among the best in both rallies and rallycross, but there could some competition on its way. Looming large in the mirrors is an ambitious young man already shown to possess prodigious talent, and with his targets set high. Is Russ worried about losing his crown?. Not a bit of it, the young man is teenage son Paul and already he looks like living up to dad's reputation.

Top class British Championship motor sport returns to Croft Circuit in three weeks time with a day of frenetic action that will decide the 1992 RAC British Rallycross Championship.

For the second year Croft Circuit has secured the honour of hosting the final round of the prestigious British Championship and this years event looks like being even better than last years thrilling final as not only is the overall title still open, but each of the three class titles have yet to be resolved.

The organising Darlington and District Motor Club expect in the region of 75 competitors for the event and the racing is sure to be fast and fierce.

There is a strong North East interest in the series final as Yorkshiremen Russell Spink and Tony Bardy respectively lead Divisions Three and Two. Aiming to put his name in the record books as the first Irishman ever to claim the British crown is Denis Biggerstaff whose Division One Metro 6R4 boasts some 500 brake horse power, can accelerate from 0-60mph in around 3 seconds and will reach 130mph on the shale surface in the fastest part of each lap. There will be around forty races during the day with action starting at noon on the fastest circuit in Europe and one which claims to be 'Too tough to tame'.

Who will be the British Champion?, Can Britain's best drivers tame the toughest track?. September 27th is the day you can find out. Be there or be square!.
